AT&T Work Within the Community

The Whitney Oaks Board of Directors are excited to share they have made an agreement with AT&T to bring high speed broadband fiber service to the Community, including Springfield.

AT&T have informed us work within the Association will begin first in the Pioneer and upper Black Oak/Coldwater areas with limited traffic interruptions. There is currently no firm start date. We have attached a map of the first phase of the work, as well as a Fact Sheet of frequent questions we have been receiving regarding the AT&T upgrades. Parking in the Association

Parking is not permitted on the street in the Association between the hours of 12:00 a.m. to 6:00 a.m. Short-term parking variance requests can be made via management. Please be sure that your request is made in writing and e-mailed to mikki.cooper@managementtrust.com, a minimum of 24 hours prior to your needs. Please also note that the management office hours of operation are from 9am – 4pm Monday through Friday. If you are making a request for Saturday or Sunday, please ensure that the request is received before close of business on Friday. For longer-term requests, please be sure to complete a parking variance request form at https://whitneyoaks.org/documents/. Please be sure to follow the instructions on the form and submit photos with your request.

Parking variances will not be permitted for boats, trucks, vans, house trailers, campers, recreation vehicles or other vehicles containing living quarters. Vehicles such as these may be parked temporarily in a driveway or in a street in front of the owner's lot for a period of not more than forty-eight (48) hours for the purposes of loading and unloading. Whitney Oaks Wildlife Notes

One day recently, I was going for a walk on Clubhouse Drive. As I rounded the big loop I thought I noticed an unnatural object on a dead tree not far off the ground. I looked more closely and saw that it was an adult **Cooper's hawk** perched there facing me not more than 30 feet away (see photo below). I had never gotten a good photo of this species before so I hurried home, got my camera and rushed back in my car to where I had last seen the bird. There it was, still sitting on a branch in the same spot. I got out of the car and snapped a few photos. Interestingly, as I was photographing the hawk I heard a whir of wings and some California quail erupted from under some bushes near the hawk and flew away. My guess is that the hawk knew the quail were there and was waiting for the right time to conduct a surprise attack. If so, my presence foiled its plan.

Cooper's hawks and Sharp-shinned hawks are the two most commonly seen medium-size hawks in Whitney Oaks. At a distance they look similar in size. Actually, Cooper's hawks are somewhat larger (14-20 inches tall vs. 10-14 inches, respectively). Females are larger than males in both species so male Cooper's hawks tend to be similar in size to female Sharp-shinned hawks.

Most of the time I find them notoriously difficult to tell apart. The birder books indicate that the tip of the tail feathers of Cooper's hawks is rounded while the tip of the tail of sharpshinned hawks is flat across. Personally, I have found this difference hard to observe unless the bird is relatively close and the tail feathers are clearly visible. A characteristic I have found more reliable is that the adult Cooper's hawk has a prominent dark crown and a pale gray neck while the sharp-shinned hawk is more uniformly gray on the top and back of its head. (Unfortunately, I do not have a good photo of a Sharp-shinned hawk.) In my opinion, other differences between the two species (e.g. head size, leg thickness, wingspan) are not very useful unless you are a very experienced birder which I am not. Juvenile plumage adds another degree of difficulty.

Both species are commonly found living in urban or suburban areas. They can often be seen in people's yards, on fences or on light poles. I once saw one perched on a bird bath in a front yard on Clubhouse Drive. Being predators, they typically feed on small birds and mammals. If you have a hawk harassing the birds at your birdfeeder it is almost certainly one of these hawks. They are fast flyers with rapid wingbeats as they dart from place to place sometimes gliding in the process. At a distance, rapid wingbeats and body size tell me I'm looking at one of these two hawk species.
