Common Areas – Condominium Edition

Sometimes common areas are hard to distinguish especially in a detached condominium area; Abby Court, Lawton Court, Kensington Court, and Sterling Drive.

Here are some things to consider:

- If you see a weekly service provider (Bianco Landscape Management), chances are the common area landscaping is completed by the Association. Common areas may include locations in the front, back and side of your home, but will not include any areas or plantings in your fenced yard areas.
- Making changes to common areas are prohibited unless Board approval has been granted. For example; adding gravel/step-stone paths, plant removals, plant additions.
- It is also wise to be mindful of where outside décor items like statues and pots are placed. Items placed in common areas may be damaged during service.
- Like all other homes in the community, exterior alterations, like fencing changes, do require ARC applications submittal and approval prior to work beginning. ■

Association Privacy

The Whitney Oaks Community Association may have taken measures to increase community privacy and protect the Whitney Oaks Community Association common areas and amenities, via community cameras, access gates and parking enforcement. However, those should not be relied upon to protect the safety and security of individual homeowners and their personal property, including but not limited to mail and packages. We would like to remind homeowners that it is important to keep your doors locked, vehicles secured and to remove personal belongings out of view as well as turning on outdoor lighting at night. Always report any suspicious activity to the Rocklin Police Department. ■

Whitney Oaks Wildlife Notes Ed Price

Until this spring I had never seen a young bird takes its first flight. In our backyard I have a bluebird-size nest box attached to a pole and secured to a bush adjacent to one of our windows. The box is facing the house and about 18 inches from the window pane. A pair of Bewick wrens love this nest box and have built a nest and raised young in it for several years. On May 29th I was working in the room by the nest box, keeping one eye on the adults diligently bringing food to their five young in the box. I noticed that one of the young was frequently poking its head out of the entrance hole. I assumed it was a more dominant fledgling with an insatiable appetite who wanted to be first in line to receive a tasty insect when the adults returned. This scenario went on for some time. Suddenly the fledgling's body filled the entrance hole and, in an instant, it flew with its little wings to a nearby branch. Before I knew it, another fledgling appeared in the hole and also flew to a nearby branch. In less than 10 minutes all five young had left the nest box. Needless to say, I so enjoyed witnessing and photographing this event.

Bewick wrens are the only wrens I have seen in Whitney Oaks. As you can see in the photo of the adult below, they are relatively small birds with long, slightly down-curved bills and are adorned with a white horizontal stripe (eyebrow) extending from over their eyes to the back of their head. The tail feathers are barred with black stripes and are often held upright. Adult males vigorously sing a loud melodious song in the spring as they advertise their territory. Look for them near bushes and hedges.





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
