#### Parking in the Association

Parking is not permitted on the street in the Association between the hours of 12:00 a.m. to 6:00 a.m. Short-term parking variance requests can be made via management. Please be sure that your request is made in writing and e-mailed to mikki.cooper@managementtrust.com, a minimum of 24 hours prior to your needs. Please also note that the management office hours of operation are from 9am – 4pm Monday through Friday. If you are making a request for Saturday or Sunday, please ensure that the request is received before close of business on Friday. For longer-term requests, please be sure to complete a parking variance request form at <a href="https://whitneyoaks.org/documents/">https://whitneyoaks.org/documents/</a>. Please be sure to follow the instructions on the form and submit photos with your request.

Parking variances will not be permitted for boats, trucks, vans, house trailers, campers, recreation vehicles or other vehicles containing living quarters. Vehicles such as these may be parked temporarily in a driveway or in a street in front of the owner's lot for a period of not more than twelve (12) hours in any twenty-four (24) hour period for the purposes of loading and unloading. as of November 2, 2022. In an effort to limit parking for access to the schools surrounding the Association, parking on the private streets in the Hillcrest Community while school is in session or during a school event is not permitted. In order to enforce this restriction street parking on Hillcrest Drive, Western Way, Vivien Way, Pheasant Lane and Chasen Court shall be limited to a maximum of three (3) hours per day on school days and during school events.

### Whitney Oaks Wildlife Notes

California Quail also known as California Valley Quail are one of the more handsome birds found in Whitney Oaks. They are a medium size plump bird with a forward-facing crest or plume on the head (see photos below). The plume looks like a single feather but actually consists of six interlocking feathers. In addition, males have a dark brown cap, a black face outlined with white stripes, a gray-blue chest and a brown belly with white streaks. Females lack the facial markings of the male and are mainly gray-brown with a light-colored belly.

California quail are usually seen on the ground in relatively large groups called "coveys". They are typically found in or near dense cover such as low-hanging bushes, plants and tall grass. Wild blackberry bushes are particularly attractive. Thick impenetrable cover offers protection from both ground and aerial predators. But not always! One day I was walking on Clubhouse Drive and saw a sharp-shinned hawk fly into a tree on the opposite side of the street. I stopped to look at the hawk which promptly flew off its perch directly at a large bush. To my surprise, a covey of quail exploded from under the bush with the hawk in hot pursuit. Both quail and hawk flew by me and over a downhill housetop out of sight. I can't help but wonder if the hawk captured a dinner.

One of the reasons California quail are often seen in large groups is that they raise large families. Females nest on the ground and lay an average of 12-14 eggs per clutch. The tiny precocious young leave the nest the day after hatching and are able to feed for themselves by instinctively picking up seeds and other food items from the ground. By 10 days of age they are ready to fly for short distances.

Quail are territorial during the spring breeding season. The male advertises its territory by a call which sounds like "chi-CA-go". Male and female pairs share the care of offspring which, no doubt, contributes to the bonding of family groups. Sometimes they form multifamily "communal broods" consisting of at least two females, multiple males and many offspring.

In closing, did you know that the California quail is our State Bird? It was christened so in 1932.
