AT&T Work Within the Community

AT&T has notified us that Phase 6 (soon to be completed) of the fiber optic broadband infrastructure work is now underway in our community. This phase involves digging a 2-inch trench to access existing underground equipment and prepare the neighborhood for broadband fiber services with near gigabyte speeds as an option to cable.

Whitney Oaks Wildlife Notes Ed Price

Hooded Mergansers are a type of duck found throughout North America. They occasionally visit Whitney Oaks in our winter and spring months and are seen on our golf course ponds. Hooded mergansers are relatively small for a duck averaging about one and a half pounds. Identification is aided by their thin serrated bill and a collapsible fanshaped head crest. Males have a prominent black head crest with a white patch while the crest on females is cinnamon-brown (see photos below). Males are quite colorful with black and white markings and chestnut brown sides while females are relatively bland in appearance. This sexual dimorphism is characteristic of many duck species and is related to the fact that females choose their mates and the more colorful males are most likely to be selected. Male courtship behaviors are also important to females in mate selection. When courting, males expand their head crests, bob and throw their heads back while emitting croaking calls.

Mergansers are often referred to as "fish ducks" since fish is one of their primary sources of food. They also prey on crayfish, frogs and aquatic insects. They are well adapted for underwater foraging since their eyes modify their refractive properties underwater to provide clarity of vision. In addition, a nictitating membrane (i.e. third eyelid) protects their eyes from underwater debris. Webbed feet facilitates swimming underwater and they are less buoyant than puddle ducks which allows them to stay submerged for up to two minutes at a time.

Female hooded mergansers, like female wood ducks, typically nest in tree cavities near water. In 2021 a female hooded merganser nested in one of my wood duck nest boxes in the pond by the big loop of Clubhouse Drive. When I opened the box in late winter to prepare it for the wood duck nesting season, there she was incubating a clutch of eight white eggs (see photo with a wood duck egg for comparison). Unfortunately, she subsequently abandoned the nest and eggs. I felt bad for disturbing her.

Once the female starts her month-long egg incubation she is abandoned by the male. Within 24 hours after hatching, the mother calls to her young from below the nest cavity and they leap to the ground or water below. Young are precocious and take to foraging for food right away. In about 70 days they can fly.
